The part-time **Graduate Diploma in Foundations of Canadian Law** is designed to give working professionals without a legal background a foundational understanding of key Canadian legal concepts. Required courses cover Canada's legal history and structure as well as skills-focused topics, such as legal research and writing. A wide range of elective options give students the opportunity to dig deeper into specialized topics related to their interests.

Program Format

The part-time diploma is designed to be completed in 16 months (four terms). Classes are seminar-style, delivered through live video conferencing. Students are required to complete 18 credits of course work, including 12 credits of required courses, followed by 6 credits of elective courses.

Required Courses

Canadian Legal Research and Analysis [3 credits]

This course is designed to familiarize students with core Canadian legal research and analytical skills. You will work extensively with the legal problem-solving skills required within a common law regime, becoming familiar with the research and reasoning skills that are required to conduct legislative, case law, and theoretical legal research and analysis. The primarily assignment-based nature of this part of the course requires a significant and "steady" time commitment.

Academic and Applied Legal Writing [3 credits]

This course is designed to familiarize students with core graduate-level legal academic writing skills. Students will learn the preferred style and organization of legal academic work products, as well as how to communicate legal analysis and critique in written form.

Introduction to Canadian Public Law [3 credits]

This course will introduce students to the Canadian legal system and Canadian public law. It is designed to provide a broad understanding of how the law operates in Canada and to present foundational concepts and doctrines that will enable students to pursue more detailed inquiries and studies into Canadian law. The course will enable students to understand and explain the general structure of the Canadian legal and political system, including the three branches of government and their relationship to one another; the role of constitutionalism in Canada; the three primary topics of Canadian constitutional law (federalism, civil liberties and Aboriginal and Indigenous rights); as well as the basic doctrines and applications of administrative law.

Introduction to Canadian Private Law [3 credits]

This course provides students with an introduction to private law in Canada, including Contracts, Torts, Property and Business Organizations. In addition to traditional style lectures, the course is designed for students to critically engage with the material through participation in class exercises.

Elective Courses

Students will take 6 credits in elective courses giving them the opportunity to study topics that are relevant to their academic and professional goals and interests.

Students have access to a broad range of electives on topics such as:

- Administrative Law
- Business Law
- Constitutional Law
- Dispute Resolution
- Energy and Infrastructure Law
- Financial Law
- Health Law
- Intellectual Property Law
- Labour Relations and Employment Law
- Privacy and Cybersecurity Law
- Securities Law
